

India to Launch First All-India Household Income Survey in 2026

In a landmark step towards strengthening data-driven policymaking, the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) has announced that it will conduct the first-ever All-India Household Income Survey in 2026. This move will help understand income distribution, assess technological impacts on wages, and fill existing gaps in welfare and economic inequality data. The survey will be guided by a Technical Expert Group (TEG) chaired by Surjit Bhalla, former Executive Director at the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

Why in News?

The Ministry of Statistics has confirmed the launch of a nationwide household income survey in 2026, a first-of-its-kind effort to capture accurate income data from Indian households. It seeks to address longstanding data gaps, particularly in income, wage patterns, and technology's influence on earnings, which are crucial for welfare and economic policies.

Objectives and Aims

- To capture income distribution patterns across Indian households.
- To assess the impact of technology adoption on household wages and earnings.
- To enable better targeting of welfare schemes through accurate income data.
- To align with international best practices in income data collection.

Technical Oversight

• Technical Expert Group (TEG) set up under the leadership of Surjit Bhalla.

The TEG will provide guidance on,

- Survey concepts and definitions
- Sampling design
- Estimation methods
- Incorporating global best practices from countries like the US, Canada, South Africa, and Australia.

Implementation and Strategy

- Survey to be executed by the National Statistical Office (NSO).
- Expected to include diverse income sources wages, selfemployment, remittances, and digital earnings.
- Will improve upon earlier efforts that faced field-level data reliability issues.
- Efforts will be made to ensure transparency, accuracy, and granular regional insights.

Significance

- First dedicated income-centric survey in independent India.
- Will help bridge gaps in existing economic surveys, which primarily focus on consumption or employment.
- Useful for policymakers, economists, and planners to tackle income inequality and improve social safety nets.
- Could lead to restructuring of income-based welfare schemes like PM-KISAN, subsidy targeting, or DBT frameworks.

In a world experiencing an uptick in geopolitical instability, the GPI serves as a crucial indicator of current global trends in conflict, safety, and militarisation.

What is the Global Peace Index?

The Global Peace Index is an annual quantitative analysis that evaluates peace based on 23 indicators across three main domains:


- Societal Safety and Security

Due to the prolonged war in Ukraine, sanctions, and internal political repression, **Russia ranks last**, followed by Ukraine. India's Performance in Global Peace Index 2025

India ranks **115th out of 163** nations, with a GPI score of **2.229**, reflecting a **0.58% improvement** over the previous year. India's trajectory has shown gradual improvement over recent years:

- 2025: Rank 115
- 2024: Rank 116
- 2023: Rank 126
- 2020: Rank 139
- 2019: Rank 141

Despite internal unrest, cross-border tensions, and militarisation, India has seen improvements in crime perception, political stability, and terrorist impact indicators.

Shubhanshu Shukla Pilots Axiom-4 on SpaceX Falcon 9 to ISS

On 25 June 2025 at 12:01 pm IST, Group Captain Shubhanshu Shukla began his ascent to the International Space Station on board SpaceX's Falcon 9 Block 5 from Launch Complex 39A, Kennedy Space Center. This marks the second time an Indian has ventured into space and the first Indian to live and work onboard the ISS.

Who Is Shubhanshu Shukla? A Pilot Turned Astronaut

Born on **10 October 1985** in Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh, Shukla graduated from the National Defence Academy in 2005 and was commissioned into the IAF's Fighter Stream in June 2006. By March 2024, he had risen to the rank of Group Captain, accruing over 2,000 hours of flight time in combat aircraft like Su-30 MKI, MiG-21/29, Jaguar, and Hawk. He joined ISRO's Gaganyaan astronaut cadre in 2019, trained in Russia and Bengaluru, and was named to the Ax-4 mission crew in early 2024.

Falcon 9 Block 5 & Crew Dragon: A Trusted Pair

The Falcon 9 Block 5, certified by NASA in November 2020, is a reusable, medium-lift rocket noted for its 100% crewed mission success rate and redundant systems. The mission uses a new Crew Dragon capsule, piloted autonomously, ferrying a four-member international crew to the ISS.

A Global Crew and Mission Objectives

Axiom-4's command structure includes former NASA astronaut **Peggy Whitson** and mission specialists from **Poland** and **Hungary**, alongside pilot Shukla. Over **14 days**, the crew will conduct **around 60 scientific experiments**, seven of which are **Indian-designed**, spanning microgravity, biology, and materials science.

A Milestone for India's Space Odyssey

This mission represents India's first government-backed presence on the ISS and the nation's long-awaited return to human spaceflight since Rakesh Sharma's 1984 mission. It also complements the Gaganyaan programme, positioning India alongside global spacefaring nations.

Technical Delays and Final Countdown

The launch was postponed multiple times due to weather, technical, and safety checks including a liquid oxygen leak in early June. Ultimately, the team resolved all issues, and the final launch window opened on 25 June.





India celebrates 10 years of the Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT), launched on June 25, 2015, as a flagship scheme to improve urban living standards by ensuring water supply, sewerage, green spaces, and urban mobility. With more than 2 crore tap connections, 1.5 crore sewer links, and ₹2.73 lakh crore worth of projects sanctioned, AMRUT has become a cornerstone of India's urban transformation story.

Why in News?

The Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA) marked a decade of AMRUT and AMRUT 2.0 on June 25, 2025, showcasing key milestones and outcomes in improving water supply, sanitation, stormwater drainage, and urban mobility across Indian cities. The scheme's success demonstrates India's progress towards sustainable and inclusive urban development.

Objectives of AMRUT

- Provide tap water and sewerage connections to every urban • household.
- Create green spaces and parks to enhance livability.
- Promote non-motorized transport and reduce urban pollution.
- Empower Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) through reforms and • capacity building.

India's Strategic Autonomy on Display at SCO 2025

At the 2025 Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Summit in Qingdao, China, India's Defence Minister made headlines by refusing to sign the joint statement at the Defence Ministers' meeting. The draft omitted any reference to the Pahalgam terror attack, despite highlighting the Jaffar Express hijacking in Pakistan, prompting India to reject the final statement. This firm stance underscored India's unwavering commitment to fighting terrorism and maintaining strategic autonomy, sending a strong signal to the international community.

Why in News?

India's refusal to sign the SCO joint statement in June 2025 marks a significant diplomatic shift. The action spotlights India's consistent zero-tolerance stance on terrorism and its readiness to stand alone within multilateral frameworks when core security concerns are diluted or ignored.

National Affairs

- In a major step toward mitigating human-wildlife conflict, Union Minister Bhupendra Yadav announced the creation of a Centre of Excellence at WII-SACON, focusing on the use of Al-driven solutions, public sensitisation, and rapid response mechanisms. Backed by previous advisories (2021) and detailed guidelines (2022), the initiative comes amid rising fatalities due to tiger and elephant attacks, particularly in states like Maharashtra, Odisha, and Uttar Pradesh. - India is set to integrate its Rare Donor Registry with the e-• Rakt Kosh national blood platform to ensure quicker, safer, and more cost-effective access to rare blood groups like Bombay, Rh-null, and P-null. Developed by ICMR-NIIH, the registry contains over 4,000 rare donors, screened using advanced DNA testing kits. The integration will benefit patients with thalassemia, hemophilia, and sickle cell disease, while upgraded point-of-care tests have significantly reduced diagnosis costs. The move marks a milestone in India's goal toward a digitally connected, selfreliant blood management system. (Click here to read article)
- In a historic move to promote educational equity, IIT-Delhi has introduced a special PhD admission drive for Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribe (ST) candidates. This initiative, which runs until June 30, 2025, addresses a persistent shortfall in reserved seat intake at the doctoral level, as revealed to a parliamentary committee. Despite relaxed eligibility norms, the institute has received fewer applications, prompting department-wide changes to encourage supernumerary admissions. (Click here to read article)
- In a landmark move to boost the circular economy, CSIR-NIIST and NECTAR have signed an MoU to establish vegan leather manufacturing units in Meghalaya and the Northeast region, utilizing agro-waste such as rice straw and fruit residues. This initiative aligns with Atmanirbhar Bharat, Make in India, and Swachh Bharat, focusing on sustainable production, women empowerment, and MSME support. Additionally, CSIR-NIIST's partnership with GIZ India will launch a Centre of Excellence for Building Integrated Photovoltaics (BIPV), accelerating India's clean energy transformation. - In a landmark move to enhance the Rath Yatra 2025 experience, East Coast Railway (ECoR) launched the 'ECoR Yatra' mobile app, offering real-time train info, special Rath Yatra train schedules, accommodation details, and ticket booking options. Available on the Google Play Store, the app-featuring multilingual support and linked to NTES and IRCTC-caters to lakhs of Puri-bound pilgrims, ensuring smooth navigation, live updates, and access to passenger amenities, marking a significant leap in digital railway services during mass events. - In a significant reform aligning with NEP 2020, the CBSE will allow Class 10 students to take board exams twice a year starting from 2026-27. The first exam is mandatory, while the second is optional for those wishing to improve scores in up to three academic subjects. This move aims to reduce exam stress, offer flexibility, and facilitate smoother Class 11 admissions. New provisions also cover compartment students, sports quota, and snow-bound areas, making the system more inclusive and progressive. (Click here to read article)
- The Government of India launched Dharti Aaba Janbhagidari Abhiyan (DAJA) on June 15, 2025, marking the largest tribal empowerment campaign in India's history, aiming to reach over 5.5 crore tribal citizens across 31 states/UTs. Named after Birsa Munda, this initiative honors tribal heritage while delivering on PM Modi's vision of inclusive governance. In just nine days, DAJA enabled 1.68 lakh Ayushman cards, 1.38 lakh Aadhaar enrolments, and 22,000+ Ujjwala Yojana connections. (Click here to read article)
- The National e-Governance Division (NeGD) has rolled out a 2-day 'AI in Governance' training programme at IIT Delhi, aiming to boost the digital capacity of 59 government officials. Conducted under CB Phase III of Digital India, the programme includes interactive sessions, policy discussions, and group exercises to foster responsible AI adoption in governance. The initiative reflects India's strategic push for tech-driven governance reforms and AI integration in public administration. (Click here to read article)
- The Union Environment Ministry held a review of Project Elephant, confirming the completion of Phase-I elephant census in Northeast India, where over 16,500 dung samples were collected. In efforts to reduce elephant deaths due to railway accidents, 3,452 km of tracks were surveyed and 77 high-risk areas identified. The meeting also highlighted progress in DNA profiling of captive elephants and announced the inclusion of sloth bear and gharial in the Species Recovery Programme, showing a broader commitment to wildlife conservation and conflict mitigation. - India has successfully integrated wildlife conservation into infrastructure through the construction of its first animal overpass corridor on the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway. Built by the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), the corridor features multiple overpasses and underpasses tailored to the natural terrain, enabling the safe movement of species like tigers and leopards. The project sets a national precedent in eco-sensitive development, with other states like Punjab and Maharashtra adopting similar models. (Click here to read article)
- In an effort to close the gap between tribal welfare policies and their on-ground implementation, the Ministry of Tribal Affairs has launched the Adi Karmyogi programme. Announced during the Adi Anveshan conference, the initiative aims to train over 20 lakh stakeholders and build a motivated cadre of officials across India. The move addresses the key insight that the real obstacle in tribal development lies in poor implementation, not the absence of schemes. (Click here to read article)
- The Indian government has approved the setting up of the CIP-South Asia Regional Center in Agra to advance research and innovation in potato and sweet potato cultivation. With India being the world's second-largest producer and consumer of potatoes, the center will focus on improving yields, developing climate-resilient varieties, reducing import dependence on seeds, and boosting exports. - The Emergency was imposed exactly 50 years ago on June • 25, 1975, marking the beginning of what historians consider one of the darkest chapters in the history of the Indian republic. This 21-month period witnessed the unprecedented suspension of democratic institutions, fundamental rights, and constitutional governance that had defined India since independence. Indira Gandhi had initially risen to power on an **electoral landslide in 1971**, but her administration soon faced mounting challenges that would ultimately lead to the constitutional crisis. The convergence of economic hardship, political opposition, and judicial scrutiny created a perfect storm that pushed Gandhi toward authoritarian measures.

States in the News

 On June 20, 2025, U.P. Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath inaugurated the 91.35 km Gorakhpur Link Expressway, built at a cost of ₹7,283 crore, highlighting the state's transformation from BIMARU status to an 'Expressway State'. Connecting Azamgarh, Gorakhpur, Sant Kabir Nagar, and Ambedkar Nagar, the expressway strengthens infrastructure, boosts trade, and paves the way for investment and regional upliftment. The initiative reflects the double-engine government's focus on inclusive development, positioning U.P. as a national growth engine. (Click here to read article) On June 20, 2025, PM Modi launched multiple rail projects worth ₹2,750 crore in Odisha, marking a significant push toward regional connectivity and development. The inauguration of the Sonepur–Purunakatak rail line connected Boudh district to India's rail network for the first time. - In a pre-election welfare boost, Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar has raised social security pensions from ₹400 to ₹1,100 per month, benefiting over 1 crore elderly, widows, and disabled citizens starting July 2025. The hike, the first since 2005, coincides with Assembly elections later this year and is aimed at strengthening NDA's political positioning amid Opposition welfare promises. Aimed at tackling Bihar's power deficit, this cost-effective, compact, and scalable SMR system will boost energy security, industrial growth, and sustainability. Complementing this, a 1,000 MW battery storage project has been approved, alongside praise for Bihar's reforms like 8 million smart meters and a sharp drop in power losses. - In a bold blend of politics and infrastructure, Bihar CM Nitish Kumar inaugurated a 4.57 km six-lane bridge over the Ganges, linking Patna to Raghopur—the political bastion of his rival Lalu Prasad and his son Tejashwi Yadav. The move, just ahead of elections, signals Kumar's strategic outreach into opposition territory, where he was warmly received, highlighting his confidence and the bridge's potential to boost connectivity, regional development, and his political narrative of progress and inclusion. - In a historic stride towards educational equity, Tripura has been declared fully literate under the ULLAS – Nav Bharat Saaksharta Karyakram, joining Mizoram and Goa in achieving over 95% literacy among individuals aged 15 and above. The success is attributed to robust community participation, widespread door-to-door mobilization, and digital tools like the ULLAS app. Launched in 2022, the ULLAS scheme aligns with NEP 2020 and supports Viksit Bharat @2047 by empowering youth and adults with foundational skills and lifelong learning opportunities. A 2022 cameratrap survey by the Wildlife Institute of India detected the elusive predator in the Amguri animal corridor, highlighting the area's ecological value. - In a landmark shift in global finance, gold has risen to become the second-largest reserve asset after the U.S. dollar, according to a European Central Bank (ECB) report. Central banks, especially from emerging economies, increased gold holdings as a hedge against inflation, geopolitical risks, and currency sanctions. Gold's share in reserves grew to 19% in 2024, surpassing the euro's 16%. Although demand was strong post-2022 due to the Russia-Ukraine conflict and market instability, analysts now foresee a slowdown in gold-buying momentum. (Click here to read article)

- India's net direct tax collection declined by 1.39% to ₹4.59 lakh crore in Q1 FY2025-26, largely due to slower advance tax growth and a drop in corporate tax receipts. While gross direct tax grew by 4.86%, a significant rise in refund issuances (58%) eroded the net collection base. Corporate advance tax rose modestly by 5.86%, while non-corporate advance tax dipped by 2.68%. These trends highlight early fiscal pressures and the need for close monitoring of tax compliance and economic recovery in India. (Click here to read article)
- From July 2025, the National Automated Clearing House (NACH) will transition to NACH 3.0, offering a more secure, efficient, and transparent framework for recurring financial transactions such as salary credits, SIPs, EMIs, and utility payments. Lehecka, who pushed him in a tough second set, showed signs of promise but couldn't sustain the momentum in the decider. - Under the Yuva Nidhi scheme, the Karnataka government has disbursed ₹11.70 lakh to 39,132 unemployed youths in Yadgir district via Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT). Graduates receive **₹3,000/month** and diploma holders **₹1,500/month** for up to **two years**, post a six-month grace period after course completion.
