Divya Deshmukh Creates History: Wins FIDE Women's Chess World Cup 2025

India's rising chess star Divya Deshmukh scripted history on July 28, 2025, by defeating veteran Koneru Humpy in the tiebreaks to win the FIDE Women's Chess World Cup held in Batumi, Georgia. At just 19 years old, Divya not only clinched one of the most prestigious titles in women's chess but also became India's fourth female Grandmaster (GM).

A Battle of Generations

The final of the FIDE Women's Chess World Cup was a clash between experience and youthful brilliance. Koneru Humpy, India's first woman Grandmaster and a legend in women's chess, brought her immense experience, being currently ranked World No. 5. Divya Deshmukh, ranked World No. 18, entered the event as an underdog, but showed remarkable determination and composure against her senior. The two classical games played earlier had ended in draws, pushing the match into rapid tiebreaks.

The Decisive Tiebreaks

In the first rapid game, Divya held Humpy to a solid draw. The second game proved decisive,

- Playing with black pieces, Divya capitalised on a critical endgame mistake by Humpy.
- She converted the advantage with precision to claim victory.
- This win not only gave her the World Cup title but also fulfilled her dream of becoming a Grandmaster, a feat she described as "fate."

Divya's Journey to the Top Early Achievements

- Divya was crowned World Junior Champion in the girls' section in 2024.
- She was instrumental in India's gold medal win at the Chess Olympiad in Budapest, where she also bagged an individual gold.



Grandmaster Title

With this win, Divya joins an elite list of Indian women who hold the Grandmaster title,

- Koneru Humpy
- R. Vaishali
- Harika Dronavalli
- Divya Deshmukh (the youngest among them at present).

Overcoming Odds

Despite her lower FIDE ranking and Humpy's status as the World Rapid Champion, Divya remained fearless. She admitted that her draw in the first classical game "felt like a loss" as she missed winning chances, but she kept her composure to seize the opportunity in the rapid format.

Koneru Humpy: The Veteran Opponent

At 37 years old, Koneru Humpy remains one of the greatest ambassadors of Indian chess. She was once the youngest woman to become a GM, breaking Judit Polgar's record at the age of 15 years and 27 days.

Even though she lost the final, Humpy praised Divya's preparation and acknowledged that the youngster was "clearly better" during stretches of the match.

The Significance of the Win

Divya's victory is a landmark for Indian chess,

- It underscores India's growing dominance in the global chess arena.
- The win adds another Grandmaster to India's roster.
- For women's chess in India, it is a generational milestone, inspiring young players to dream bigger.
- Her triumph also adds momentum to India's recent surge in the chess world, where young talents are increasingly making their mark in prestigious international tournaments.

A Historic Win for Shah Rukh Khan and Rani Mukerji

In a landmark moment for Indian cinema, Shah Rukh Khan received his first National Award for Best Actor for his blockbuster film Jawan. Known as the "King of Bollywood," this award marks a major milestone in his illustrious career. Alongside him, Rani Mukerji was honored with the Best Actress award for her gripping role in Mrs Chatterjee vs Norway, a film that highlighted the struggles of a mother fighting against a foreign legal system for her child's custody.

Actor Vikrant Massey also bagged the Best Actor award for his inspirational role in 12th Fail, a film based on the real-life story of Manoj Kumar Sharma, who overcame poverty to become an IPS officer.

Regional Cinema Shines Bright

The 71st edition of the awards not only celebrated Bollywood but also gave a strong platform to regional films.

- The Best Telugu Film award went to Bhagavanth Kesari,
- Best Tamil Film was won by Parking,
- Best Malayalam Film was Ullozhukku,
- and Shyamchi Aai took the Best Marathi Film title.
- The Telugu superhero film HanuMan also received widespread recognition, winning the award for Best Action Direction and Best Film in AVGC (Animation, Visual Effects, Gaming, and Comics).

Major Highlights of the Awards

- Sam Bahadur, a film based on Field Marshal Sam Manekshaw, was recognized as the Best Film Promoting National and Social Values.
- Rocky Aur Rani Kii Prem Kahaani, directed by Karan Johar, won the award for Best Popular Film Providing Wholesome Entertainment, with Vaibhavi Merchant also taking home Best Choreography for its hit song Dindhora Baje Re.
- The Best Film award went to 12th Fail, which moved audiences nationwide with its inspiring storyline.
- The Kerala Story bagged multiple awards, including Best Direction for Sudipto Sen and Best Cinematography by Prasanthanu Mohapatra.

- The non-feature film category highlighted social, cultural, and environmental storytelling.
- Best Documentary Film went to God Vulture and Human.
- The Silent Epidemic was honored for Best Non-Feature Film Promoting Social and Environmental Values.
- Best Short Film went to Giddh The Scavenger.
- The Spirit Dreams of Cheraw was recognized as Best Debut Film in the non-feature section.

National Affairs

- India is finalising a Green Steel Procurement Policy to mandate 25% public steel purchases from low-emission sources. Green steel, produced using hydrogen-based DRI, electric arc furnaces, and renewable energy, is crucial since the steel industry contributes 10–12% of India's emissions. Key initiatives include the Steel Scrap Recycling Policy, PAT Scheme, and National Solar Mission. Challenges include high costs, evolving technologies, and limited demand-side incentives. The policy aims to make India a global leader in sustainable steel production. (Click here to read article)
- The NCERT is introducing new curriculum modules for Classes 3 to 12 featuring Group Captain Shubhanshu Shukla's space mission aboard the ISS and India's Operation Sindoor, highlighting the nation's strength in defence and space exploration. Along with these, the modules will include Mission LiFE to promote sustainable living and lessons on the Partition to provide historical context. This initiative, guided by the Ministry of Education, aims to make learning more contextual, contemporary, and rooted in national identity. (Click here to read article)
- In a major success, Indian security forces launched Operation Mahadev in Jammu and Kashmir's Dara region, neutralising three Pakistani Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) terrorists after a fierce encounter. Conducted jointly by the Indian

- Army, CRPF, and J&K Police, the operation began after intelligence inputs of militant movement near Dachigam National Park, with reinforcements and drone surveillance deployed. Authorities are investigating whether the slain militants were linked to the April 22 Pahalgam attack that killed 26 people. (Click here to read article)
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched the 'Gyan Bharatam Mission' on July 27, 2025, to digitise and preserve over one crore ancient manuscripts through a National Digital Repository. With enhanced funding of ₹60 crore, the mission aims to make India's civilisational knowledge accessible to students and researchers globally. PM Modi called the manuscripts "Chapters of India's soul", aligning the initiative with the 'Viksit Bharat' vision. He also hailed UNESCO's recognition of 12 Maratha forts as World Heritage Sites, further highlighting India's cultural richness. (Click here to read article)
- Remona Evette Pereira, a 20-year-old Catholic student from Mangalore, created history by performing Bharatanatyam for 170 hours, entering the Golden Book of World Records. Her seven-day marathon, completed on July 28, 2025, broke the previous record of 127 hours. Trained under Guru Sri Vidya for 13 years, she combined spiritual devotion with cultural artistry, wearing a rosary throughout the performance. Supported by St. Aloysius University and blessed by church leaders, her feat was hailed as a tribute to India's classical dance heritage and a symbol of cultural unity. (Click here to read article)
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi celebrated the Aadi Thiruvathirai festival at Gangaikonda Cholapuram, Tamil Nadu, marking the birth anniversary of Emperor Rajendra Chola I. He released a commemorative coin in the king's honour, performed rituals at the Cholisvaram temple, and admired its Chola-era architecture. The event also celebrated the millennial anniversary of Rajendra Chola's naval expedition to Southeast Asia, with cultural highlights including hymns by odhuvars and a performance by Ilaiyaraaja. The Prime Minister lauded Rajendra Chola I's maritime legacy, architectural brilliance, and cultural contributions, calling the Chola dynasty a golden chapter in Indian history. - Communications Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia launched the Sanchar Saathi mobile app in Hindi and 21 regional languages to extend its reach across India. With over 46 lakh downloads, the app allows users to report suspicious communications, block or trace lost/stolen phones, and check unauthorized mobile connections. The launch, held during a stakeholders' meeting in New Delhi, involved representatives from law enforcement, telecom providers, financial institutions, C-DOT, RPF, and DoT, marking a major step in combating telecom-related cyber frauds and ensuring inclusive digital safety. - According to Crisil Ratings, India's private sector will invest ₹77,000 crore in thermal power projects between FY26 and FY28, boosting its share to nearly one-third of total investments. Overall, thermal power investments will double to ₹2.3 lakh crore in the next three years. With Adani, Tata, JSW, and Vedanta leading mostly brownfield expansions, and long-term 25-year PPAs signed by state discoms, projects are expected to be financially viable. Vedanta Power, post-demerger, plans a 15 GW expansion, including revival of a 2,200 MW portfolio, backed by a tariff ensuring 15% IRR. (Click here to read article)
- The Lok Sabha on July 30, 2025, approved the extension of President's Rule in Manipur for another six months beyond August 13. Minister of State Nityanand Rai stated that peace is prevailing, with only one fatality and no casualties in the last four months. Assured that the law and order situation is under control, and the government is working through dialogue to end ethnic tensions and establish permanent peace in the state. - India has achieved a **Gini Index of 25.5**, ranking as the **4th most equal country in the world**. This progress, supported by welfare schemes like **Jan Dhan Yojana**, **Ayushman Bharat**, **PMGKAY**, **and DBT**, has lifted **171 million people out of poverty** since 2011. However, challenges such as **wealth disparity**, **outdated poverty lines**, **and unequal access to opportunities** remain. India's achievement showcases a major step toward **inclusive growth**, but sustaining and deepening this equity will require **continued reforms**. (Click here to read article)
- The Kaziranga National Park in Assam has conducted India's first-ever Grassland Bird Census (March–May 2025), using acoustic technology to identify and monitor bird species. Conducted by forest officials, researchers, and conservationists, the survey recorded 43 species, including critically endangered and endemic birds like Finn's Weaver. The census marks a breakthrough in biodiversity monitoring, highlighting both conservation successes and ongoing threats like habitat loss and climate change. (Click here to read article)
- The sacred Piprahwa relics of Lord Buddha, discovered in 1898 in Uttar Pradesh, have been repatriated to India after nearly being auctioned in Hong Kong in May 2025. This was made possible through a public-private partnership between the Government of India and the Godrej Industries Group. Union Culture Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat credited the success to the vision of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, while Pirojsha Godrej highlighted the company's commitment to cultural preservation. The relics will soon be on public display, symbolizing India's role as a global guardian of heritage and peace. (Click here to read article)

- The Government of India has finalized seven PM MITRA Parks across Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Gujarat, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, and Maharashtra, with an outlay of ₹4,445 crore till 2027-28. Aimed at attracting ₹70,000 crore investments and creating 20 lakh jobs, the scheme is complemented by the Samarth skill development programme and the National Technical Textiles Mission. Together, these initiatives will boost India's textile exports, strengthen domestic manufacturing, and position India as a global textile hub. (Click here to read article)
- Indian Railways has launched Kavach 4.0 on the Mathura-Kota section of the Delhi-Mumbai corridor. Designed at the highest safety level (SIL 4), it monitors train speeds, applies brakes automatically, and provides cabin-based signal information, especially useful in low visibility conditions. With ₹1 lakh crore annual safety investment, training of 30,000 personnel, and integration into engineering curricula, Kavach 4.0 is set to revolutionise railway safety in India within the next six years. States in the News

- PM Modi inaugurated the new terminal of Tuticorin Airport (capacity: 20 lakh passengers annually) and launched projects worth ₹4,800 crore in Tamil Nadu. Key works include highway upgradation (NH-36 and NH-138), Kollidam bridge, North Cargo Berth-III at V.O. Chidambaranar Port, and railway electrification and doubling projects. These initiatives aim to boost multimodal connectivity, reduce logistics costs, enhance tourism, and promote port-led industrial growth, positioning Tamil Nadu as a key driver of Viksit Bharat. - Bihar CM Nitish Kumar has announced the formation of the Bihar Rajya Safai Karmachari Ayog to protect the rights, welfare, and social upliftment of sanitation workers. The commission, consisting of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, five members, and a woman or transgender representative, will focus on rehabilitation, grievance redressal, and welfare scheme monitoring. The move aims to bring sanitation workers into the social and economic mainstream and improve their living conditions. (Click here to read article)
- Odisha signed 33 MoUs worth \$902 million under its Apparel & Technical Textile Policy 2022 during Odisha-TEX 2025, aiming to create over 1 lakh jobs by 2030 and establish textile clusters in six districts. The state enhanced employment subsidies, with ₹6,000 for men and ₹7,000 for women, to attract investors and strengthen workforce participation, positioning Odisha as the textile hub of eastern India. - The Andhra Pradesh Tourism Development Corporation (APTDC) has partnered with Mastercard to enhance the state's global tourism profile. Following a commitment made at **Davos**, the partnership aims to attract **international** tourists by integrating Mastercard's global user base into Andhra Pradesh's tourism circuit. Plans include targeted promotions, digital payment support, and increased visibility for hotels and resorts, with a focus on both coastal **destinations and cultural heritage sites**. This collaboration is expected to position Andhra Pradesh as a premium global travel destination. (Click here to read article)
- Madhya Pradesh's Jabalpur will host India's first Hindimedium MBBS college from the 2027-28 academic session, offering 50 MBBS seats initially. Approved by the Madhya Pradesh Medical University's executive council, the college will use already translated Hindi textbooks and provide clinical training at the existing government hospital. With plans to expand to MD and MS courses in Hindi, this pioneering step aims to break language barriers in medical education, making healthcare studies more inclusive and accessible. - The Maharashtra government will observe August 7, the birth anniversary of Bharat Ratna Dr. M.S. Swaminathan, as Sustainable Agriculture Day. A Government Resolution directs agricultural universities to set up Dr. MS Swaminathan Bio-Happiness Research Centres focusing on sustainable agriculture, climate adaptation, and food security. The day will also feature statewide events and awards in his honor, recognizing the Father of India's Green **Revolution**. (Click here to read article)
- Cochin International Airport Limited (CIAL), India's first PPPmodel airport, is embarking on a major green and digital expansion plan. It includes setting up the world's first airport-based green hydrogen plant, scaling up solar power to 50 MWp, expanding MRO services, and creating an aerotropolis model with IT parks and lifestyle zones. The initiatives not only align with carbon neutrality goals but also strengthen India's aviation and trade ecosystem under the vision of Make in India and Atmanirbhar Bharat. - In a significant move to strengthen rural healthcare services, Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar has announced a substantial increase in incentives for ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activists) and Mamta workers. ASHA workers will now receive ₹3,000 per month (up from ₹1,000), while Mamta workers will earn ₹600 per safe delivery (up from ₹300). The decision, announced via social media, aims to boost morale and enhance healthcare access for mothers and newborns across Bihar's villages. (Click here to read article)
- The Punjab government, under CM Bhagwant Mann, has lifted the 28-year-old ban on heritage sports like bullock cart races, dog races, horse races, and pigeon racing. The move aims to revive Punjab's cultural heritage while ensuring animal welfare through strict monitoring. With this decision, traditional games once banned in 1997 are set to return, giving the youth a cultural connection and celebrating the true spirit of Punjab's traditions. International Affairs

- Syria will hold its first parliamentary elections since the fall of Bashar al-Assad from 15-20 September 2025 under interim President Ahmad al-Sharaa. The temporary constitution (March 2025) created a People's Assembly of 210 seats, with one-third appointed and two-thirds elected via provincial electoral colleges. The polls face hurdles due to sectarian violence in Sweida, reports of atrocities by government forces, and Israeli intervention. Success could pave the way for a permanent constitution and long-term stability. (Click here to read article)
- The US and EU have reached a historic trade deal, setting a 15% tariff on EU exports to America, down from the threatened 30%. The deal includes \$600 billion EU investment in the US and \$750 billion in American energy imports, aiming to cut reliance on Russian power sources. While hailed as a major win for the US, the EU views it as a stabilizing yet unbalanced agreement. The move averts a damaging trade war and reshapes global trade dynamics. - Turkey has unveiled its most powerful non-nuclear bomb, Gazap, at the IDEF 2025 defence fair in Istanbul. Weighing 970 kg, it disperses over 10.16 fragments per metre, three times more than standard bombs, creating a massive kill radius. With thermobaric properties reaching 3,000°C, it is compatible with F-16s and F-4s and could soon be dronedeployable. Alongside Gazap, Turkey also revealed the NEB-2 Ghost, a deep-penetration bunker-buster capable of piercing 7 metres of reinforced concrete. Both weapons showcase Turkey's growing defence ambitions and nearnuclear conventional capability. (Click here to read article)





- At the World Artificial Intelligence Conference 2025 in Shanghai, Chinese Premier Li Qiang urged the world to build a global consensus on balancing AI development and security risks. He stressed the importance of open-source Al, warning against technological monopolies. This comes as the US, under President Trump, pursues a low-regulation strategy to cement its AI dominance, while continuing to restrict chip exports to China. The conference also heard warnings from experts like Geoffrey Hinton and calls from UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres for stronger international cooperation, underscoring the growing urgency of ethical and safe AI governance. - A massive 8.7-magnitude earthquake struck off Russia's Kamchatka Peninsula, triggering widespread tsunami warnings across the Pacific, including Japan, Alaska, Hawaii, and the US West Coast. Waves of up to 4 metres were recorded in Kamchatka, with Japan issuing a tsunami advisory and several Pacific nations bracing for unusual currents. While minor injuries and property damage were reported, no major casualties have occurred so far. Experts warn of ongoing aftershocks and stress that the Pacific Ring of Fire remains a highly volatile seismic zone. (Click here to read article)
- UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer has declared that the UK will recognise a Palestinian state unless Israel halts its military operations in Gaza, ends West Bank annexation plans, and commits to a peace process toward a two-state solution. With 140 countries already recognising Palestine and France pledging support, the move highlights growing international momentum for Palestinian statehood amid a worsening humanitarian crisis in Gaza. - US President Donald Trump has announced a 25% tariff on India, effective August 1, 2025, along with an additional penalty for India's continued oil and defense purchases from Russia amid the Ukraine war. Trump criticized India for imposing some of the highest tariffs and non-monetary trade barriers in the world and for maintaining close ties with Moscow. The move follows months of speculation and comes after India declined to finalize a trade deal within Trump's 90-day suspension period. (Click here to read article)
- India has sent 5 Metric Tonnes of humanitarian assistance to Syria, including anti-cancer medicines, antibiotics, and anti-hypertensives, according to MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal. This consignment is part of India's continued humanitarian assistance, reflecting commitment to supporting the Syrian people during their ongoing health crisis. (Click here to read article)

- Australia has decided to include YouTube in its under-16 social media ban, reversing an earlier promise to treat the platform as an educational tool. Backed by alarming findings from the eSafety Commission, the move aims to reduce children's exposure to harmful content. While the law will enforce age verification and impose massive fines for noncompliance, critics warn of privacy risks and unintended consequences for young users. YouTube Kids remains unaffected. - The US has announced a 25% tariff on Indian imports while signing a deal with Pakistan to develop its oil reserves. The move, linked to India's BRICS membership and oil purchases from Russia, highlights Washington's aim to counter China, strengthen Pakistan ties, and reduce its trade deficit. It has major implications for India-US trade relations, Pakistan's energy sector, and the geopolitical balance in South Asia. (Click here to read article)
- On July 30, 2025, Russia's remote Kamchatka Peninsula experienced a massive 8.8 magnitude earthquake, followed just hours later by the fiery eruption of the Klyuchevskoy volcano, the tallest active volcano in Europe and Asia. The volcano, standing 4,700 metres high, spewed lava, ash, and explosions, creating a brilliant night spectacle. While the lava flow was dramatic, the impact was limited as the region is sparsely populated. The earthquake triggered a tsunami warning across Kamchatka and as far as Japan, but it was lifted 11 hours later when no destructive waves reached populated areas. (Click here to read article)

Agreements/MoUs Signed

- India's workforce expanded by 17 crore jobs between 2017-18 and 2023-24, taking total employment to 64.33 crore, as per RBI's KLEMS database. The Labour Force Participation Rate rose to 60.1%, the unemployment rate fell to 3.2%, and youth unemployment dropped to 10.2%, below the global average. Notably, female participation surged to 40.3%, highlighting a significant shift towards inclusive employment growth, according to the Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS). (Click here to read article)
- As of June 2025, unclaimed deposits in Indian banks stood at ₹67,003 crore, with SBI (₹19,329.92 crore) and ICICI Bank (₹2,063.45 crore) topping the list. To tackle this, the RBI launched the UDGAM portal for tracing deposits. The government ruled out ETFs for Virtual Digital Assets, citing RBI warnings about crypto risks. Meanwhile, the Bima Sakhi Yojana has enrolled 1.48 lakh women, with 60% of premiums from rural areas, boosting financial inclusion across India. (Click here to read article)
- The SEBI and stock exchanges have revised the Enhanced Surveillance Mechanism (ESM) for firms with a market cap below ₹1,000 crore, effective July 28, 2025. The changes include monitoring based on a three-month positive price

- trend and a PE ratio limit of twice the Nifty 500 index. Companies under Stage 1 face 100% margin requirements, a trade-for-trade system, and tight price bands. Covering 28 firms, the move aims to reduce speculative trading, enhance market integrity, and safeguard retail investors. (Click here to read article)
- India's concert economy is set to create 12 million jobs by 2030-2032, transforming the live events sector into a major employment and economic engine, particularly in Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities. Large-scale concerts, festivals, and live events are fueling growth in hospitality, logistics, tourism, and digital media, while boosting local economies with revenues like ₹641 crore from Coldplay's Ahmedabad concert alone. With an estimated ₹15,000 crore industry value, the sector holds massive potential but requires urgent skilling initiatives to address the shortage of trained professionals in production, lighting, and event technology. - Reliance Jio has launched JioPC, a cloud-based virtual desktop service that converts any television into a personal computer using the Jio Set-Top Box. With Ubuntu OS, LibreOffice, browser-based Microsoft Office, Adobe Express, and AI tools, JioPC enables web browsing, programming, learning, and document editing. Available through affordable plans starting at ₹599 per month, JioPC features 4 CPUs, 8GB RAM, and 100GB cloud storage. It offers a cost-effective, contract-free alternative to traditional computers, though it currently lacks support for webcams and printers and requires a stable internet connection. - The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has raised India's growth forecast to 6.4% for both 2025 and 2026, up from earlier estimates of 6.2% and 6.3%. This revision reaffirms India as the fastest-growing major economy, far outpacing China (4.8% in 2025) and the US (1.9% in 2025). The improved outlook is attributed to a benign external environment, weaker US dollar, and improved global financial conditions. Based on financial year data, India's growth is projected at 6.7% in FY2025 and 6.4% in FY2026. (Click here to read article)
- Between FY19 and FY25, India recorded 65,000 crore digital payments worth ₹12,000 trillion, driven by UPI adoption and government-backed initiatives. With over 4.77 crore digital touch-points deployed under the RBI's PIDF, and a Digital Payments Index of 465.33 (Sept 2024), India has expanded digital inclusion to rural and remote areas. - Between FY21 and FY25, 11 public sector banks collected around ₹9,000 crore in penalties for failure to maintain minimum balance in savings accounts, according to Finance Ministry data presented in the Rajya Sabha. - India finished 20th at the FISU World University Games 2025 in Germany, winning 12 medals — 2 gold, 5 silver, and 5 bronze. Schemes and Committees News

- The National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) has launched the 'Veer Parivar Sahayata Yojana' in Srinagar to strengthen legal aid for defence personnel and their families, coinciding with NALSA's 30 years of service. Announced by Justice Surya Kant, the scheme will use Sainik Boards at Zilla, Rajya, and Kendra levels as legal aid centres, involve defence families as paralegal volunteers, and address routine challenges like land disputes, matrimonial issues, and service entitlements, ensuring that soldiers remain focused on their duty while their legal rights are protected. - Five years after its launch, the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 has introduced major reforms in India's education system, including a new school structure, integrated curriculum, NIPUN Bharat mission, CUET, and credit-based flexible learning. - The Union Cabinet has enhanced the budget for the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Sampada Yojana (PMKSY) to ₹6,520 crore, up by ₹1,920 crore, to strengthen India's food processing sector. - ISRO will launch NVS-03, NVS-04, and NVS-05 by 2026 to strengthen NavIC, India's regional navigation system. NavIC, with **7 satellites** (3 geostationary, 4 inclined), provides civilian and strategic services with high accuracy. The NVS series brings indigenous atomic clocks and L1 band support for better compatibility. Applications include defense, shipping, railways, disaster alerts, and time **synchronization**. - Latam-GPT, set to launch in September 2025, is the first large AI language model developed by 12 Latin American countries under Chile's CENIA with support from CAF and AWS. Based on Llama 3, it focuses on cultural diversity, Indigenous language preservation, and open-source accessibility. With initial work on Rapa Nui translation, it aims to strengthen schools, hospitals, and public services. making AI a democratizing element in the region. (Click here to read article)
- The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) will launch the NASA-ISRO Synthetic Aperture Radar (NISAR) today at 5:40 pm from Sriharikota using the GSLV-F16 rocket. Designed to operate in a Sun-synchronous orbit at 747 km, the mission will use dual-band radar technology (L-band from **NASA** and S-band from **ISRO**) to capture highly detailed Earth images every 12 days for 3 years.
